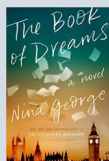
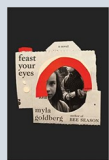

Machines Like Me – Ian McEwan

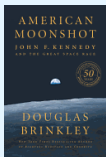

Normal People – Sally Rooney

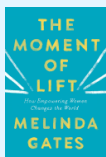
